
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Longing for The Season


the world called the Rideau Canal and you can skate it from one end to

In February there is a snow sculpture contest just like the one in Hokkaido. In fact, the Japanese teams of ice sculptors often win top place.

Families love cross-country skiing in the national park, 15 minutes from the capital. The 65 km trail system takes you deep into the forest of big pines heavy with snow where you can eat your lunch

in small huts along the way. There are four ski resorts for good quality skiing and snowboarding just 20 minutes away. Tobogganing is also a fun activity enjoyed by kids and adults too. After a winter day spent outside, Canadian children have rosy cheeks and are so tired they can hardly stay awake to eat their dinner!

I spent my childhood outside in the snow and ice with my four brothers and sisters building forts for snowball fights, making tall snowmen, sliding down snowy hills and climbing back up again and again. There we were, wearing colorful snowsuits, big boots, wool hats and scarves covering our faces. We could only see each other's eyes! We had so much fun! I'm glad my parents gave us so many opportunities to enjoy the great Canadian winter together. They are my fondest memories.


