Believe it or not, but Scotland is the No.1 destination in the UK for New Year's Eve - or Hogmanay, as it is called in Scotland. Edinburgh, Scotland's capital city, hosts the biggest and most famous New Year's Eve event in Britain. ## Exchange Program Report

Study Abroad at Minzu University of China (中央民族大学)

Two months have already passed since my study abroad experience in China started. When I decided to study abroad, many people were surprised and asked, "Why?" Therefore, let me write a little bit about the reasons I began learning Chinese and decided to come here to study. There are two main reasons.

Frankly, my attitude towards languages has changed. This was the first motive for my decision. I spent almost all my university life studying areas related to English. While talking to foreigners, there were many problems because of my lack of English skills. However, those problems were easily solved if I persistently tried to communicate with people. After noticing this, I came to realize that proficiency in one target language was not of key importance but mutual understanding by using that language was. This idea drove me to study another language besides English. Additionally, it was just after I started learning Chinese that I decid-
